At 11:00 AM, November 11, 1918, the guns of World War I fell silent across Europe and Armistice Day was born. Eight years later a Presidential Proclamation invited people to observe the day with appropriate ceremonies. In time it was changed to Veterans Day and became the focal point for official national Veterans Day ceremonies.

CHAIRMAN - Major General Albert C. Zapanta USA (Ret)

General Zapanta is the President and CEO of the United States - Mexico Chamber of Commerce in Washington, DC and has worked in business, government and politics over thirty-six years. His Masters is in Public Administration and he has a Doctorate in International Political Economy from USC, as well as a graduate degree from the Harvard School of Business. He began his military career enlisting in the U.S. Army in 1964, and was commissioned Second Lieutenant in 1966. He had many Company and Battalion Commands throughout his



career including in Vietnam. In addition to many presidential appointments he served as commander of a UN mission and Special Assistant to the Chief of the National Guard. He was appointed by the Governor of Virginia to Major General. In the private sector, he was an industrial engineer for Bethlehem Steel, and Director of Governmental Affairs for ARCO until his retirement in 1993. For his combat actions he was awarded the Silver Star, five Bronze Stars for valor, the Purple Heart and thirty other awards during the Vietnam War.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, Veterans Day began with the armistice of World War I, thus making this the 92nd anniversary of that solemn event; and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Dallas are indebted to the courageous men and women who placed their lives in harms way for our country; and

WHEREAS, Dallas remembers Pearl Harbor and pays special tribute and honor to all who made the ultimate sacrifice on that day in Infamy, December 7, 1941; and

WHEREAS, special honor goes to men and women survivors who fought valiantly and courageously in the defense of Pearl Harbor against the surprise attack by the Imperial Japanese Navy. President Franklin Roosevelt declared war and the Japanese "woke a sleeping giant;" and

WHEREAS, many costly battles in the Pacific ensued until the atomic bomb attacks on Hiroshima and Nagasaki brought the Japanese to sign an unconditional surrender with General Douglas MacArthur on the USS Missouri ending the war on V-J Day September 2, 1945; and

WHEREAS, Dallas honors the men and women serving in Afghanistan under the code name "Operation Enduring Freedom," and committed to fighting against local terrorism in that region and terrorism all over the globe; and

WHEREAS, Dallas recognizes the 250th Anniversary of the National Guard, the 100th Anniversary of Naval Aviation and the 10th Anniversary of 9-11; and

WHEREAS, the Greater Dallas Veterans Foundation will produce an appropriate ceremony on Veterans Day 2011, which is designed to honor and salute those who are serving, those who have served and those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MICHAEL S. RAWLINGS, mayor of the city of Dallas, and on behalf of the Dallas City Council, do hereby proclaim November 11, 2011

HONORED KEYNOTE MILITARY SPEAKER

MAJOR GENERAL JAMES L. WILLIAMS, UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS. (RET)

Major General James L. Williams was born in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. He received a Bachelor of Science degree from Slippery Rock University, PA, in 1975. Upon graduation from the Marine Corps Officer Candidate School, he received his commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps, in March 1976.



He received Master's degrees from Georgetown University in Government and National Security Affairs in 1981; from Yale University in Hospital Management & Public Health in 1984; and from the U.S. Army War College in International Security Studies in 2000. He completed the US Army War College Combined Joint Force Land Component Commander Course; and George Washington University's National Security Program in Defense Policy. Currently, he is in the process of working on his Master's Degree in Computer Engineering and Computer Science.

Major General Williams recently retired as the Commanding General of the 4th Marine Division, a position to which he was appointed in April 2007. The 4th Marine Division is the largest infantry division in the US military and consists of nearly 22,000 Marines, Sailors, and civilians. The 4th Marine Division is spread over the entire United States, extending from Hawaii to Maine, and from Alaska to Florida. Prior to that, he was the Assistant Division Commander of the 2nd Marine Division from November 2006 until April 2007. His earlier assignments included: Deputy Commanding General for Mobilization of the Marine Corps Combat

Development Command and Assistant Division Commander for combat operations in the 2nd Marine Division, at Camp Blue Diamond, in Ramadi, Iraq. He was directly responsible for the sensitive negotiations with insurgents and terrorist groups to get them to stop fighting and cooperate with the rebuilding of Iraq.

Major General Williams has held a number of significant positions in the civilian business and corporate world. He has built and run hospitals as the Chief Operating Officer for Humana, EPIC Healthcare, and HealthTrust; in Kentucky and Texas. He assisted H. Ross Perot in the development of corporate information systems for healthcare organizations at Perot Systems. He was the Chief Information Officer for EmCare, the largest emergency physician management company in the US. He was the Chief Information Officer and Chief Technology Officer for software company, Emergisoft; he was the President, for software security company bTrade, Inc.; he has been responsible for international engineering development for classified systems for numerous defense contractors; and he has worked in international global trade consulting roles for several multi-national corporations doing business with China, Vietnam, the Western Pacific region, the Middle East, Africa, and Central and South America. He is deeply involved in local, national, and global political issues. He is a member of professional associations in the fields of academics, technology, military affairs, world trade, and global business.



GRAND MARSHAL MASTER CHIEF PETTY OFFICER WILLIAM "BILL" HUGHES

William E. "Bill" Hughes was born in Southwest Louisiana in 1921. After High School "Bill" enlisted in the U.S. Navy for 6 years. After attending Radio Communications School, Hughes was assigned to USS UTAH in Hawaiian waters. Arriving in Hawaii in November, 1940 Hughes boarded the USS Utah and was positioned in the Main Radio Room. On July 1, 1941 Hughes was promoted to pay grade E-4, even as a Radioman 3rd Class, he proudly sewed his chevron onto the left arm of his uniform.



On December 7th, 1941 at 07:55, USS Utah and dozens of other ships and stations were under attack by Japanese aircraft. USS Utah was hit by two torpedoes near midships below the waterline. Within minutes the USS Utah capsized and the survivors were swimming to safety amid machine gun fire. Sailors from sunken and badly damaged ships were assigned to various units of the Pacific fleet. Hughes was assigned to an aircraft carrier, USS Saratoga, which was torpedoed on January 12th. Sixteen sailors were killed by torpedo fire from a Japanese sub.

Bill Hughes served on several ships during the war. When

the Japanese announced their surrender, Hughes' ship, USS Gasconade, was in Leyte Gulf with 1,500 troops onboard as part of a great flotilla preparing to invade the main Japanese islands. The unconditional surrender of the Japanese was signed aboard USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay on September 2, 1945. Unfortunately the formal surrender was completed a couple of hours before USS Gasconade entered Tokyo Bay. During the Korean War, Hughes served as a Radio Instructor stateside and never saw action in Korea. He retired with 22 years service as a Master Chief Petty Officer

(Radioman), the day before all discharges and retirements were frozen because of the Cuban Missile Crisis.

In December, 1962 Hughes joined the FBI, assigned to the Dallas Regional Office in January 1963, where he participated in the FBI investigation into the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. In January 1964 he was employed by a Major Oil Company and retired in 1984. The Hughes family has lived in Grand Prairie for 48 years and he and his wife Reesa have been married 64 years.

GRAND MARSHAL CHIEF MACHINIST MATE JAMES KANAMAN

Born October 23, 1919 in McKinney, Texas, James Kanaman graduated from Frisco High School in 1938. On January 16, 1939 he joined the United States Navy and went to the Navy boot camp in Norfolk, Virginia. He sailed to Pearl Harbor in April of 1940. His assignment was aboard a destroyer called the USS Tracey, a destroyer. On December 1, 1941 he was promoted to Machinist Mate 2nd Class and within the week he would become a Pearl Harbor survivor during the surprise attack of the Japanese on the United States of America, December 7th, 1941, the attack that brought the United States officially into World War II. For the first 24 hours after the attack, no one ate or slept; all focus was on rescuing survivors. His assignment was a voluntary one of working on the USS California where he received orders that brought him from Pearl Harbor to the many Japanese islands and eventually to the Midway Islands. His assignment was to assist the crew to lay mines to hopefully hinder the Japanese fleet.



In 1945 he was assigned to the USS Carmel stationed in San Pedro, California. The ship was an invasion tanker, carrying gas and diesel, originally he was scheduled for one island invasion but found himself participating in eight. After the atomic bombs were dropped in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, they landed at Kaysu, a southern island of Japan in November, 1945.

Throughout World War II, he was stationed in the Pacific and its many battles. Twenty-one years later in June, 1959, he retired from the U.S. Navy in Norfolk, Virginia.

Upon retiring from the Navy, he was employed at the Dallas Ford Motor Plant until its closing and then joined Lucent Technology, where he had a successful career until he retired many years later. His retirement has been filled with public service, including the Dallas County Appraisal Board and the Dallas Civil Service Board. He currently resides with his wife Frances in Dallas, Texas.

December 7th, 1941-A Day

Infamy - a word we don't ever use nor often hear. The dictionary informs us that it means the result of grossly criminal, shocking or brutal action. That morning of December 7th, the

The attack on Pearl Harbor was a surprise military strike conducted by the Imperial Japanese Navy against the United States naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, on the morning of December 7, 1941. The attack was intended as a preventive action in order to keep the U.S. Pacific Fleet from interfering with military actions the Empire of Japan was planning in Southeast Asia against territories of the United Kingdom, Netherlands and United States.

The base was attacked by 353 Japanese fighters, bombers and torpedo planes in two waves, launched from six aircraft carriers. The first wave attacked at 7:35 AM. The second wave attacked at 8:55 and by 9:55 it was all over. By 1:00 PM the carriers that launched the planes from 274 miles off the coast of Oahu were heading back to Japan.

Four U.S. Navy battleships were sunk (two of which were raised and returned to service later in the war) and the four others present were damaged. The Japanese also sank or damaged three cruisers, three destroyers, an anti-aircraft training ship, and one minelayer. 188 U.S. aircraft were destroyed; 2,402 men were killed and 1,282 wounded. The fuel and torpedo storage facilities, power station, shipyard, maintenance areas, as well as the submarine piers and headquarters building (also home of the intelligence section) were not attacked. Japanese losses were light: 29 aircraft and five midget submarines lost, and 65 servicemen killed or wounded. One Japanese was captured.

Despite the numerous historical precedents for unannounced military action by Japan, the lack of any warning, particularly while negotiations were still apparently ongoing, led President Franklin D. Roosevelt to proclaim December 7, 1941, "*A date which will live in infamy*".

The road to war between Japan and the United States began in the 1930s when differences over China drove the two nations apart. In 1931 Japan conquered Manchuria, which until then had been part of China. In 1937 Japan began

to conquer the rest of China. In 1940, the Japanese government allied themselves with Nazi Germany in the Axis Alliance and, in the following year, occupied all of Indochina.

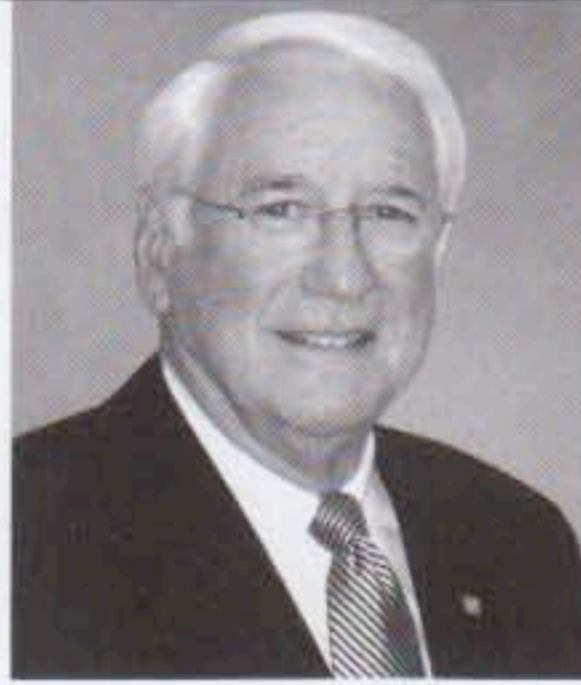
The United States, had important political and economic interests in East Asia and was alarmed by these moves by the Japanese. The U.S. increased military and financial aid to China, embarked on a program of strengthening its military power in the Pacific and cut off shipments of oil and other raw materials to Japan.

Because Japan was poor in natural resources, its government viewed these steps, especially the embargo on oil as a threat to the nation's survival. Japan's leaders responded by resolving to seize the resource-rich territories of Southeast Asia, even though that move would certainly result in war with the United States. If war was inevitable, the real problem was the danger posed by the U.S. Pacific Fleet based at Pearl Harbor. Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto, the Japanese fleet commander, planned to immobilize the U.S. fleet first with the now infamous surprise attack.

Bill Melton



Bill Melton served as Master of Ceremonies for Dallas' Annual Veteran's Day 11th Hour Ceremonies since the inception of the Program. He served as Parade Announcer for such previous Programs at Fair Park and in Downtown Dallas.

Melton served as 2005 Presidential Inaugural Parade Announcer in Washington, D.C. and announced the 2001 Opening Presidential Inaugural Ceremonies on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. He has announced at the Inaugural Celebrations of three Texas Governors.

He has Emceed the Official Grand Opening of the State Fair of Texas for many years. He served as Emcee for Dallas' Official American Revolution BiCentennial Celebration in 1976; Dallas' Official Sesquicentennial Celebration in 1986 and the Dedication and Re-Dedication of the Old Red Courthouse in 1977 and 2007, respectively, and

numerous other Dallas Parades and civic ceremonies.

Professionally, Melton served as Dallas County Treasurer for over 25 years, from 1977 through 2002, having been Elected to Office six times. He was named the "Outstanding County Treasurer in the United States", "Texas' Outstanding County Treasurer" and "County Leader of the Year", among other Awards.

Deeply involved in the Dallas civic community, Melton has also announced at the 1996 Olympic Games; Super Bowls, VI, VIII and IX; FIFA Men's and Women's World Cup Soccer; FIBA World Basketball Championships; Texas Relays for 39 years; NCAA Track and Field and Basketball Championships; World Championship Tennis; SMU and University of North Texas football and basketball; Dallas Cowboys; Texas Rangers and Cotton Bowl Classic for 32 years.

Gloria Campos is co-anchor of WFAA News 8, at 6 and 10, producer of "Wednesday's Child" and co-anchors the 5pm news. She joined WFAA as a general assignments reporter in 1984. Jack Davis, KAAM Radio

Jack Davis is a radio personality at The New Legends 770 KAAM. Jack's radio career spans nearly four decades. Jack has worked for other Dallas stations: KRLD-1080 AM; KPBC-1040AM; KKGK-1630AM; and KSKY-660AM, as well as The ABC Radio Network. For his work in Southern Gospel Music Radio, and host of a syndicated Gospel show, Jack was inducted into the Texas Gospel Music Hall of Fame. He has also been master of ceremonies for Gospel music shows in Ft. Worth and Nashville. Before his career in radio, Jack retired from Frito Lay after 19 years. Jack served as a member of the U.S. Air Force Air Police from September 1964 to September 1968, was on Temporary Duty to SE Asia 1965, guarding aircraft making raids into Vietnam from an Air Base at Takli Air Base Thailand, for which he received the Vietnam Service Medal. 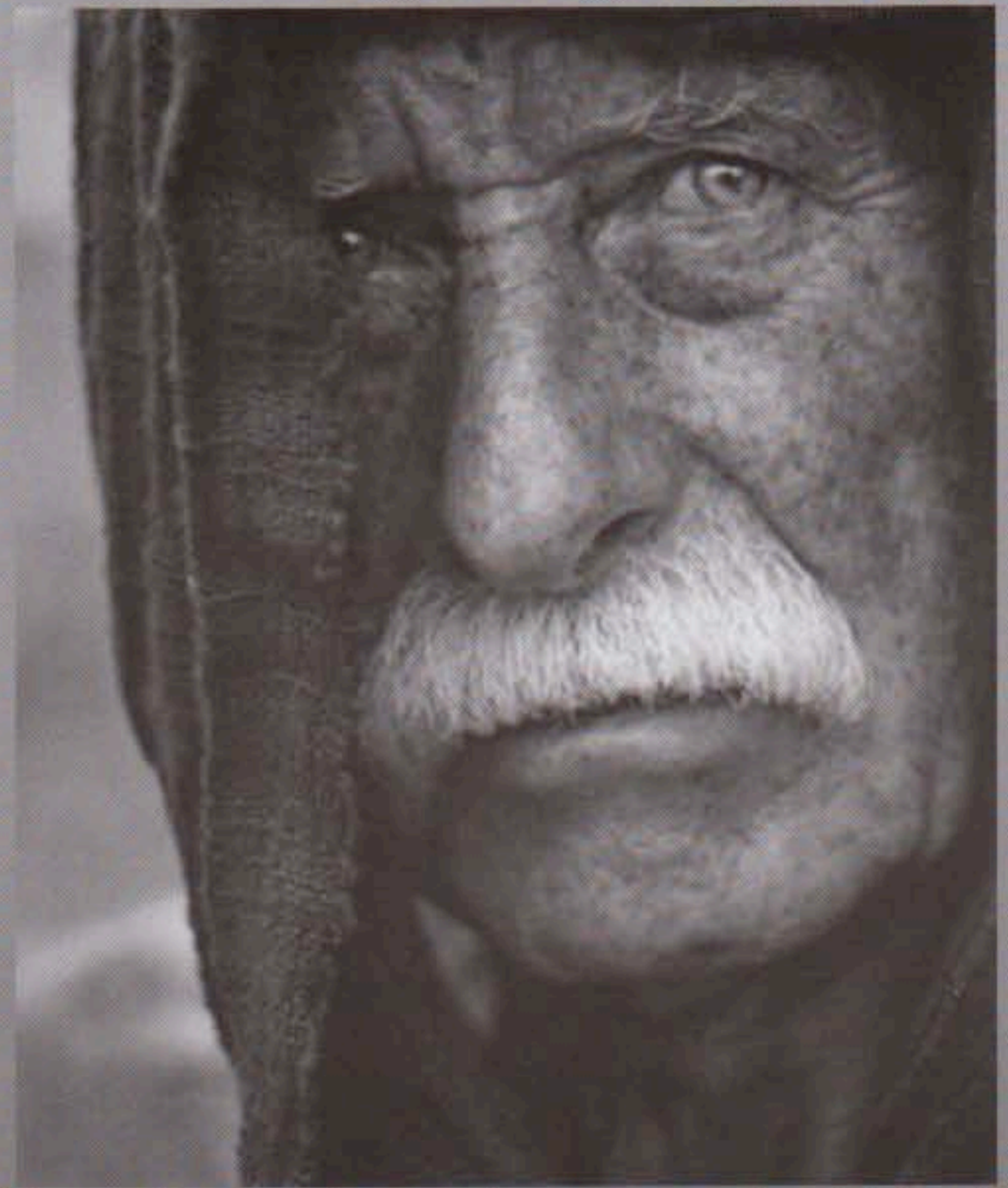

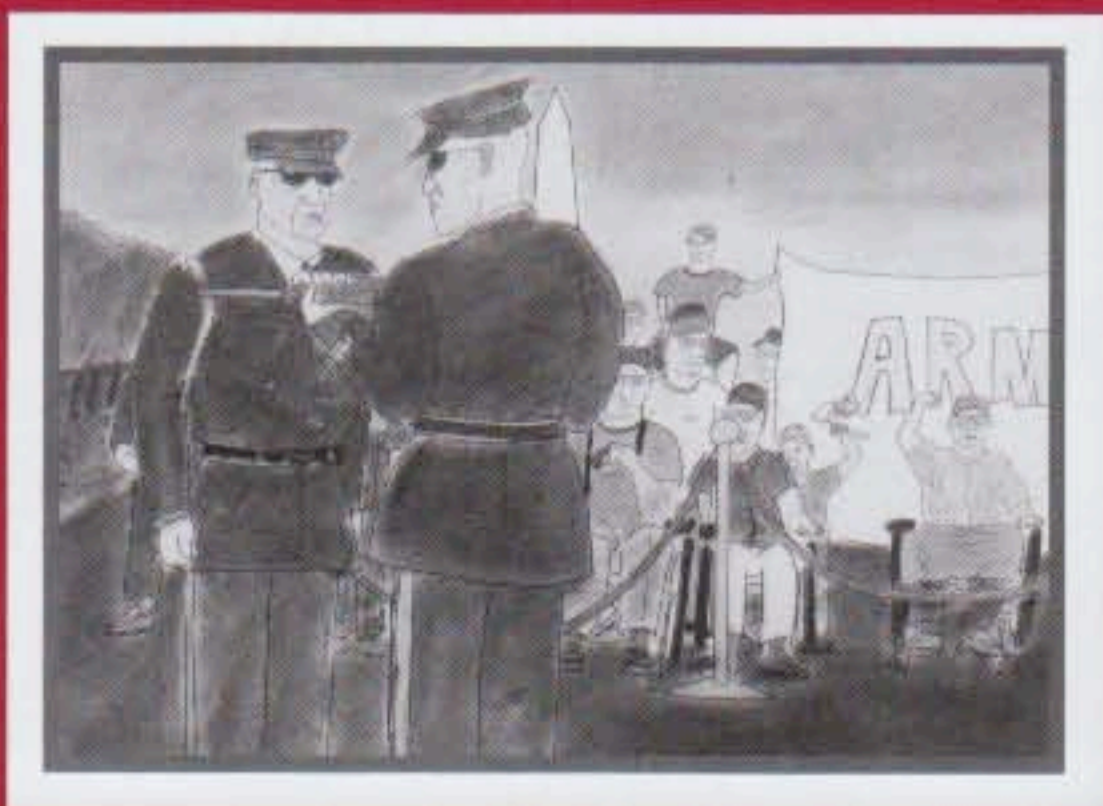

United States Merchant Marine

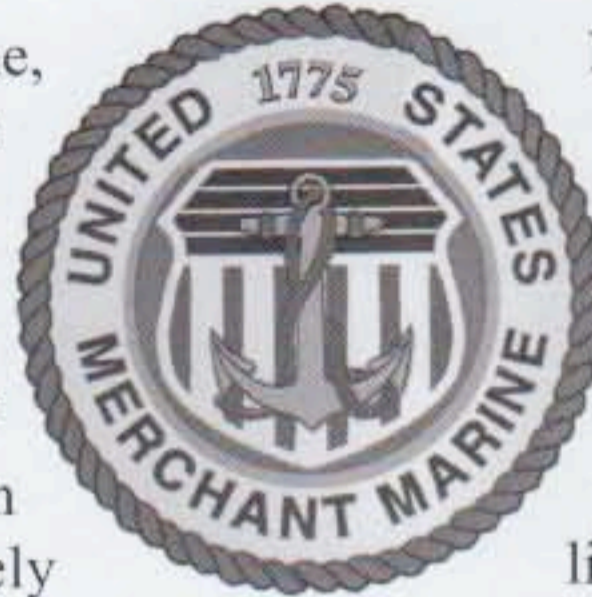
Serving our Nation in Peace and War

- A tale of the first days of our country's merchant seamen •

As dawn broke over Machias Bay, Maine, on June 12, 1775, forty men armed with guns, swords, axes and pitchforks and led by a revolutionary firebrand named Jeremiah O'Brien brought their private sloop, Unity, quietly around the lee side of Round Island. Their target, the British armed schooner Margaretta, immediately attempted to fire on the unarmed Unity, but Unity was too close. O'Brien commanded his crew to ram the British ship, boarded her and proceeded to engage in hand-to-hand combat. By the end of an hour, the British captain was mortally wounded, and the British ship had surrendered.

O'Brien and the Unity crew claimed four double fortified three-pounders, fourteen swivel guns and several smaller guns. Unity had become a warship for the soon to be proclaimed United States of America in this first sea engagement of the Revolutionary War. During the Revolutionary war, more than 11,000 Merchant Mariners died in service to our fledgling nation. They were the first to sacrifice their lives, but they would not be the last.

The War of 1812 was fought ostensibly because of the merchant marine. British warships were seizing American vessels on the high seas and impressed over



10,000 seamen into service for the British Navy or British merchant fleet. American ships were also being seized or sunk if they did not call at a British port before sailing to Europe. France responded by seizing ships that did stop at a British port. Because the United States had a limited number of Navy ships (23) the war was mainly fought with merchant ships as privateers. America had 517 privateers during the War of 1812 and these privateers eventually captured 1,300 enemy ships worth nearly \$40 million.

That was a tremendous amount of money at the time considering that Alaska was bought for \$7.2 million and the Louisiana Purchase for \$12 million. This was the primary reason the British came to the peace table. It didn't end there though. Our country has since built up its own large Merchant Marine fleet and made its own sacrifices. During the first World War more than 700 merchant ships were sunk. Over 800 merchant ships were sunk during World War II. The Merchant Marine was present at Normandy, on D-Day, and all the other World War II invasions.

The Merchant Marine continues to serve the United States in both war and peace. It has done so proudly from the Revolutionary War to the present.
